



# Key facts about sharks




▲ Sharks are fish so they have tail fins which move from side to side. Mammals, like whales, have flukes which move up and down.

▲ In the water, sharks have eyes similar to a cat to help them see and they can also feel vibrations. The shark has a supreme sense of smell too.

▲ Baby sharks are called pups. Some sharks lay eggs, others keep their eggs inside and yet other sharks grow baby pups inside them. Sharks are not all the same!

▲ Sharks come in many sizes. They can be as small as the 6 inch Dwarf Lanternshark to the 40+ ft Whale Shark!



▲ Sharks have rows of backup teeth to make sure they never run out. The size and shape of the tooth can tell you what sort of food the shark eats.



# Introduction

We are one of millions of species on a water planet in the universe. Indeed, we are made up of 70% water and depend on the oxygen coming from the ocean to breathe. Many of us depend on the food the ocean provides for us and it is our job to be stewards of the sea and to protect the sea ancients, most importantly the sharks!

The Gulf is home to 30 species of Elasmobranchs. Elasmobranchs are sharks, rays and sawfish. Many of these 400 million year old sea ancients are in serious danger because in the Far East there is a demand for their fins. Fishing for shark fins has led to many shark species coming close to extinction – which would mean that we could run out of sharks!

Nevertheless here in the Gulf there are still quite a number of sharks, rays and sawfish compared to elsewhere.



# The Problem!

Sharks are extremely important to the habitats and other fish in the seas. Sharks keep fish together in schools and closer to the shore. This makes it easier for fishermen to catch the fish for us to eat.

When the sharks eat the bigger fish in the sea, it also leaves plenty of smaller fish for us, keeping the food chain healthy and balanced. This balance means we have more biodiversity or richness in the ocean, making the ocean more bountiful and full of protein.

Part of the problem is people are scared of sharks – they do not realise how important these creatures are to keeping our seas healthy and balanced, and making sure the ocean remains rich in biodiversity and functioning as a working ecosystem. Without sharks marine habitats would be completely destroyed.

We need to cause a commotion for the ocean; and learn about these precious creatures before we lose them.

## False

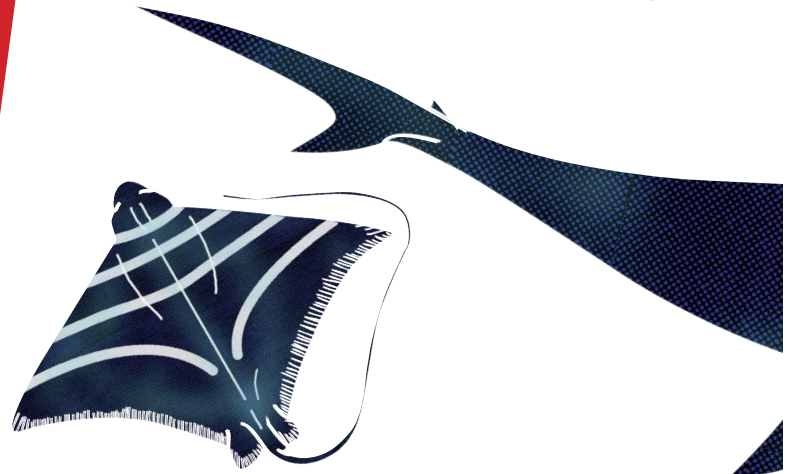

## True

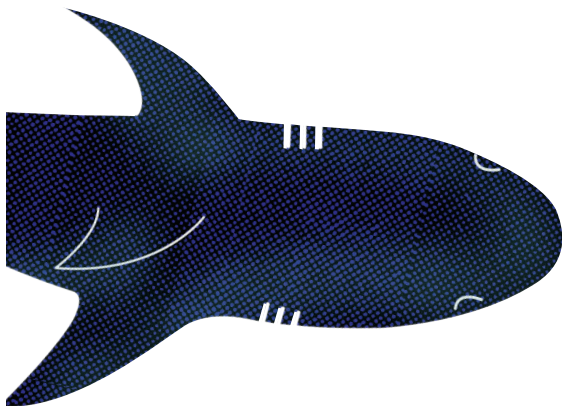
Sharks do not have a single bone in their bodies – instead, their skeleton is made up of cartilage (like the tip of your ear) to allow them to move faster and freely through the water.

Last year, only 12 people died because of shark incidents in comparison to about 100,000,000 sharks which humans killed. Is this fair?



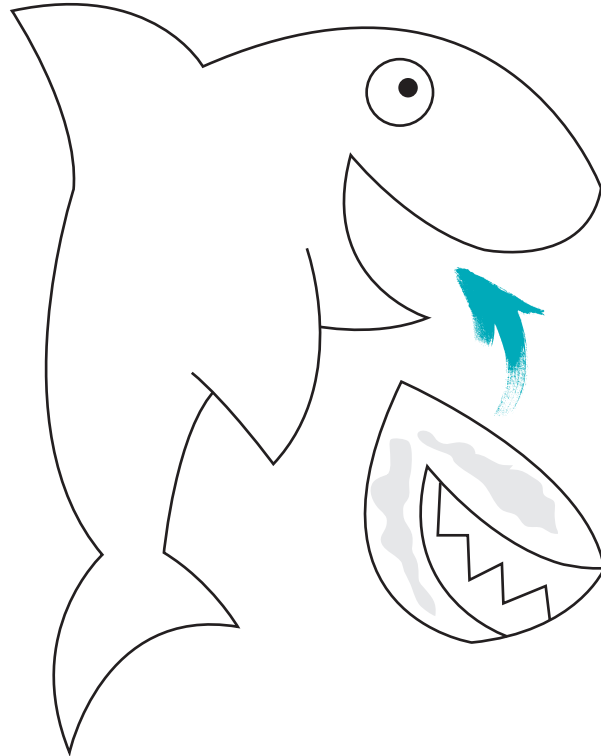


# How to make a shark...

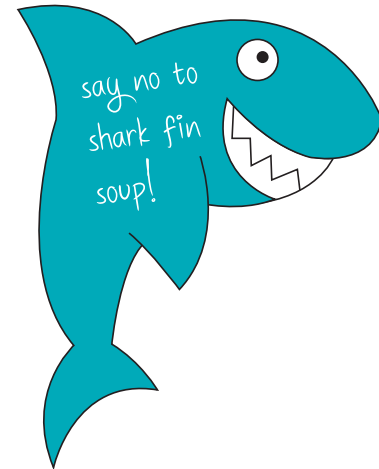
**1** Trace around the shark image and the teeth. Next cut them out.

**3** Put glue on around the teeth as shown and stick it behind the shark's mouth.



**4** To finish you could write a message on your shark and give it to someone to teach them how to protect sharks.

# Plastic Poison!

When we grow tired of our plastic toys and throw them out, have you ever wondered what happens to them? Well, they often end up in our oceans and become poisonous!

Plastic pollution also affects traditional fishing in areas such as Kerala, South India and the UAE. Fish feed on small bits of plastic, which look like tiny sea animals called plankton, causing choking or even death. In fact, when fish eat small bits of plastic, they enter our food chain and end up on our plates too.

We want to make sure that the UAE has the cleanest seas in the world – and we can do this by reducing our plastic use, by using cotton or tote bags instead of plastic bags and spreading the word!

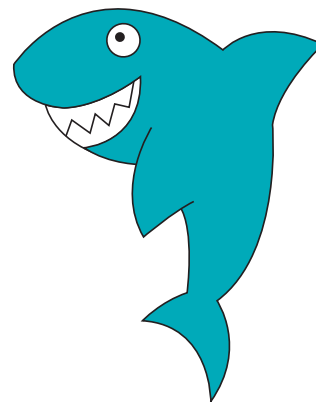
